

An -ing non-finite clause is a subordinate clause that starts with an ing verb:

The children stood and stared, willing for it to work.

Willing for it to work, the children stood and stared.



## Year 4 Non-finite Clauses

An -ing non-finite clause is a subordinate clause that starts with an ing verb:

They can also be used as parenthesis (be put in the middle of a main clause).

The children, willing for it to work, stood and stared.

Don't forget

your commas.

## Year 5 Non-finite Clauses

An -ed non-finite clause is a subordinate clause that starts with an ed verb:

Horrified by what he had witnessed, Kieran rushed for help.

Kieran rushed for help, horrified by what he had witnessed.

Kieran, horrified by what he had witnessed, rushed for help.





Beginning a non-finite clause with a noun or a noun phrase:

Blood rushing to her head, Sonia gripped on to the wall.

Sonia gripped on to the wall, blood rushing to her head.

Don't forget your comma.
