

Year 2 Apostrophes

An apostrophe for contraction (to words are joined together and letters are taken out).

Here are some examples:

do not = don't

he would = he'd

cannot = can't

should not = shouldn't

Was not = wasn't

An apostrophe for possession (on the subject or object when something belongs to them).

Here are some examples:

The teacher looked at **James'** work.

The teacher looked at **Emily's** work.

The **boy's** bag was on the floor.

Year 3 Apostrophes

An apostrophe for possession (on the subject or object when something belongs to them).

The teacher looked at **James'** work.

The **boys'** bags were on the floor. (**Plural**)

The **girl's** room was a mess. (**Singular**)
